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My art is generated through experimentation with vulnerability and intimacy in the form of blind contour portraiture. Its meaning stems from my overwhelming need to connect with people and my environment. I am constantly in flux and intentionally put myself in unfamiliar situations in an effort to better understand myself and my place in this world. There are two parts to my artistic practice, the first being "absent observation". With the use of text, I present a visual diary of my day to day thoughts and experiences. The text is designed to relatable in an effort to generate an emotive response to my work, I believe artwork gets its meaning through not just the artist's intention but by the viewers' response to the work, and through this, I am able to connect with the viewers without being physically present. Part II is "present observation". My work often has an interactive performance aspect where I invite people to sit down for a blind contour portrait. Most people that I draw have never been drawn before and are always surprised by how intimate of an experience it is. It is their


